# MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Thank you to the officers and staff who work in the Police Department and serve our Monroe community. I recognize there have been significant personnel changes within the department over the last two years. Several long-serving officers, sergeants, and Chief Tim Quenzer have retired. In 2019 the city fully welcomed Chief Jeff Jolley to the Monroe Police Department. I appreciate the work Chief Jolley and the department did in 2019 to ensure a smooth transition. It is important to me, the City Council, and Monroe residents that we retain the department's culture of service and proactive policing.

One of the values the Monroe Police Department has embraced represents a culture of community service and engagement that is unique in Washington. The 2019 Annual Report details community outreach efforts such as sponsoring quarterly dinners at Take the Next Step and raising money for the Special Olympics. The department is front and center at the city's National Night Out event, which is sponsored by the Monroe Rotary Club and attracts over 1,000 visitors. The Monroe Citizen's Academy regularly graduates over twenty citizens each year from an eight-week course to share first-hand information on how the police department operates. These are just a few of the many events and activities that are supported by the department. These outreach efforts are important because they build trust between the department and residents. This trust is essential to maintain the city's culture of community service.

The Monroe Police Department is recognized for its culture of proactive policing. The 2019 Police Assessment Report noted the department's high number of self-initiated calls and fast response times to priority calls. Our police officers, sergeants, and administrative staff are recognized beyond the City of Monroe for excellence in service. In 2019, Community Service Officer, Gabriela Escalante was honored by Pasado's Safe Haven in recognition of her work on an animal abuse case that resulted in felony convictions for Animal Cruelty 1<sup>st</sup> Degree and Possession of a Stolen Firearm. The city's K-9 Tango and Officer Southard regularly respond to assist the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office. The Community Outreach Team lead by Officer Justin Springer and social worker, Elisa Delgado were featured in the August 28, 2019 issue of the Snohomish Tribune for their work assisting unsheltered people connect with social services.

The 2019 Police Annual Report highlights events, activities, and awards received by the department. It provides data to evaluate the effectiveness of department programs. The report shares some of the great work our officers and support staff accomplished in 2019.

Please take a moment to read the report and join me in thanking Chief Jolley and the members of the Monroe Police Department for their work in 2019.





# CHIEF'S MESSAGE

Reflecting on this first full year as Chief of this incredible department, there have been many significant events and remarkable accomplishments. Every day is a testimony to the amazing connections the City has with its citizens, businesses, service organizations and other community partners to positively impact the quality of life for those who choose to live, work and play in Monroe.

**Staffing:** This was a year of transition with the retirements of two long term Sergeants, ushering in a new generation of leadership. Deputy Chief Irving accepted a permanent position after serving in an interim role for 18 months. We were very fortunate to welcome two lateral police officers to fill some vacancies and we start 2020 looking to fill one existing vacancy and an anticipated retirement in the spring.



**Accomplishments:** The department is very proud to have accomplished numerous goals this past year, one of them being the relocation and renovation of our Evidence Room. This took many months of preparation by our evidence team along with the preparation of the newly refurbished evidence space by our Public Works team. We were fortunate to receive a grant of \$20,000 for increased City campus security and also received a new Rescue vehicle through a grant with the Department of Defense. The department went through a complete Organizational and Staffing Study that evaluated how the department can best serve our community. We are in the process of implementing some of the recommendations, one being combining our Investigations and ProAct units into a combined Criminal Investigations Division. Officer Justin Springer was assigned full time to the Community Outreach team increasing our work and visibility with the Homeless in our City. The Outreach Team saw many successes with individuals in need of services. In addition, the department launched an online Trespass Notice Program allowing our business community to conveniently file a trespass notice with the department.

**Community Events:** The department has been very involved in many events connecting us with our Community. These include National Night Out Against Crime, Jayme Biendl Memorial Run, Coffee with a Cop, Special Olympics fundraising, Miracle League, Walk Your Kids to School, Easter Egg Hunt, Citizen's Academy, Shop with a Cop and the Fair Days Parade. We look forward to these positive interactions with citizens of all ages.

**2020 Goals and Objectives:** In 2020, the department plans to expand our Problem Oriented Policing Program, begin a Safe City Program, and will be working on becoming a state accredited police department which solidifies the "best practice" standards for policing. The department is taking the lead in implementing a Citywide Unmanned Aerial (Drone) Program and will once again host our very popular Youth Academy, positively investing in our youth.





# EMPLOYEE AWARDS

## EMPLOYEE OF THE YEAR:

**Community Service Officer Gabriela Escalante** received the Employee of the Year award for her inspirational commitment to excellence, high work ethic, and outstanding work in an animal cruelty case for which she was recognized in 2019 with the “Bucky Award.”

**AWARD OF MERIT:** The Award of Merit shall be presented to employees for an act of endangering themselves in preventing a serious crime, or effecting the arrest of a dangerous felon. **Officers Shaun Van Eaton and Alex Thomas** received this award for their response to a nuisance call at Denny’s on April 9th. They encountered a male subject who assaulted the officers resulting in an extensive ground fight and an attempt to disarm one of the officers. The subject was taken into custody with only minor injuries to the officers. The officers acted in accordance with the highest ideals of professional police service.

**LETTER OF COMMENDATION:** Presented to **Detective Paul Henderson** for his exhaustive work on the February homicide, no stone was left unturned and the Snohomish County Prosecutor's Office was presented with a very complete case.

# JANUARY

## 1.24.19– Male Arrested on Two Counts of Assault

The Monroe Police Department arrested a male after two groping incidents the previous week. The first incident occurred in the 19600 block of SR 2 on January 17th. On January 22nd, officers were called to a business in the 18800 block of SR 2 for another groping incident. Further investigation led detectives to the suspect who lived in Monroe who upon contact admitted to these incidents. The 24 year-old male was booked on two counts of Assault 4 with Sexual Motivation.




## 1.27.19—Jayme Biendl Memorial Run

The 8th annual **Officer Jayme Biendl Memorial 5K Run/Walk** took place with proceeds benefitting the Behind the Badge Foundation. Many participants from Corrections, Law Enforcement and the greater community came out to remember Jayme, her family, and extended law enforcement family.

## 1.31.19– Dump Truck Takes Down Power

A dump truck just off of Village Way was offloading debris and struck lines, bringing down two power poles. The driver was unhurt but was unable to exit the vehicle until Snohomish County PUD was able to secure the wires. PUD was able to restore power that same day to most of the area except for residents and businesses on Village Way. Due to the impact on the Sky Valley Food Bank, Monroe officers along with many other volunteers assisted in quickly moving food that needed to be refrigerated.





## 2.10.19—Homicide Investigation

The Monroe Police Department responded to a reported death, inside an apartment, in the 600 block of Terrace Street. The 911 caller, a resident of the apartment, along with other roommates, returned to the apartment after an evening out. There they found the victim roommate deceased with multiple stab wounds. Also in the apartment was a male acquaintance covered with blood and armed with two knives. A struggle involving the roommates and the armed suspect ensued. Several of the individuals, as well as the suspect, sustained injuries as a result of the struggle. The suspect was restrained by roommates, awaiting police arrival. The suspect, Kevin Rodriguez, was taken into police custody and booked on charges of Murder 2 and Assault 2.

## 2.27.19—Search Warrant

Monroe Police Officers went to a residence in the 500 block of S. Blakeley to serve a search warrant on a public nuisance property. A total of fourteen people exited either the residence or a trailer in the backyard. Two of the subjects were released to the Department of Corrections on felony warrants. A third was released to Redmond PD on a misdemeanor warrant. All fourteen subjects received a trespass notice from the property.

Officers entering the residence found disconnected utilities, human waste throughout to include the backyard, multiple broken windows and doors, all interior fixtures had been removed, and rubbish and trash was strewn throughout the property. Drug paraphernalia was also located.



# MARCH

## 3.5.19—Take the Next Step

Each quarter the Monroe Police Officers' Association sponsors and helps serve a community dinner at Take the Next Step. These dinners take place every Tuesday evening as volunteer cooking teams help prepare and serve dinners to those in need.



## 3.19.19—Car Vs. Pedestrian Collision

Officers responded to a car versus pedestrian collision that had occurred in the 15200 block of Woods Creek Road. Upon arrival, officers found several subjects that had been hit by a vehicle while crossing the street in a crosswalk. A family of eight was crossing Woods Creek Road when a vehicle struck three of the family members. The youngest, a five-year-old boy, was struck and thrown forward by the vehicle, and was then run over by the same vehicle, dragging him approximately 40 feet. The five-year-old was transported to Harborview with a leg fracture and multiple injuries. The driver may have suffered a medical event while driving and was transported to EvergreenHealth. On March 22nd, the boy was released in style with a ride from the police to his residence. The family had no resources to transport him and the Officers were more than happy to help out.



**4.10.19—Black Bear Sighting**

Monroe Police Officers responded to the report of a black bear seen near a residence in the area of Sawyer St SE and 171st Ave SE. Responding officers located the bear and followed it until Fish and Wildlife could respond. The Fish and Wildlife officers were able to successfully tranquilize the bear and remove it from the area.



**4.10.19—New K-9 Team**

**K-9 Tango** and his partner **Officer Jason Southard** were introduced to the Rotary Club of Monroe. K-9 Tango was purchased with money raised by Rotary through generous donations from our community. We are so appreciative of our community’s support of our K9 program! K-9 Tango and his partner went through training in March and were officially certified as a K-9 team through the Criminal Justice Training Center. They have made a big difference this past year with several captures.



**4.18.19—Special Olympics**

The Monroe Police Department kicked off a year of fundraising for **Special Olympics** with “**Tip-A-Cop**” hosted by Chef Adam Hoffman, owner of Adam’s Northwest Bistro & Brewery.

# APRIL cont.

## 4.18.19—Search Warrant

The Monroe Police Department along with the assistance of the North Sound Metro SWAT team executed a search warrant on a residence in the 18100 block of 154th Street SE in Monroe. Upon arrival, five males and four females exited from the front door of the house, a sixth male jumped out of the back window and started to run; he was taken into custody without incident. Officers searching the residence found drug paraphernalia, heroin, methamphetamine, as well as identification cards.



## 4.22.19—New Hire

The Monroe PD hired **Andrew Thomas** as a lateral Police Officer. Officer Thomas graduated from the Basic Law Enforcement Academy in September of 2016, working for Snoqualmie Police Department before his lateral transfer to Monroe. He has been a great addition to our department.

## 4.25.19—Retirement

**Sergeant Rick Dunn** retired after serving with the Monroe Police Department for 26 years. Sergeant Dunn served in many capacities throughout the years; Officer, Detective, Operations Commander, SERT Commander and Sergeant. His passion and dedication to the staff, citizens and the community will leave a lasting impression.



### 5.4.19—Kidz Club

Officer Jason Southard and Community Service Officer Gaby Escalante helped with Kidz Club, Take the Next Step's after school program where they shared about some of the activities that are a part of their job and introduced the kids to K-9 Tango.



### 5.7.19—Promotion

Officer Chuck Fuller was promoted to the rank of Sergeant before the Monroe City Council. Sergeant Fuller began his career with the City of Monroe in 2000 as a police officer. In his 19 years with the department he has served in other capacities to include: A member of the agency and regional SWAT team, Field Training Officer in which he trained many new officers over the years; and the department's Less Lethal Instructor.

### 5.20.19—Burglary Arrest

Officers responded to Frank Wagner Auditorium with a report of multiple electronic items missing from the IT room. Included in the missing items were 14 new laptops that had been removed from their boxes. Through investigation, six juvenile male suspects, ages 15-16, were identified. Charges included Stolen Property Trafficking, Theft 1, Burglary 2, and Making False Statements to a Public Servant. Ten of the laptops were recovered along with two new tablets that were not yet discovered as stolen.

# JUNE

## Scholarships

Every year the Monroe Police Officers Association (MPOA) designates scholarship money for graduating area seniors. We wish this year's recipients the best in their continuing education.



## 6.9.19—Special Olympics Fundraiser

Officer Darryl Stamey spent a Sunday afternoon bagging groceries for Special Olympics. This was a first time event in partnership with Safeway.

## 6.20.19—Employee Recognition

Officer Justin Springer was recognized for his six plus years as the School Resource Officer (SRO) at the Monroe High School with a Distinguished Service Award. The Monroe School District also presented Officer Springer with a Challenge Coin and Certificate of Appreciation.

This was Officer Springer's last year as the SRO as he accepted a position in the department as the Community Outreach Officer. He now partners with Embedded Social Worker Elisa Delgado as the team that goes out into our community working with homeless individuals who are in need of services.






### 7.2.19—Vandalism Arrest

In collaboration with the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office, Monroe Police investigators identified a 23-year-old male who was responsible for damages done to several businesses in Monroe.

### 7.22.19—New Hire

Officer Alex Nelson was hired as a lateral police officer. He began his career with Tulalip Tribal Police Department in 2018 before his transfer to Monroe. We are fortunate to have him as a part of our department.



### 7.30.19—Search Warrant

Monroe Police served a search warrant on a residence in the 17300 blk of 152nd St. The 83-year-old homeowner was transported to Providence for evaluation. Inside the home, were 23 cats that were alive, 13 deceased kittens, and one deceased cat in the freezer. Charges were forwarded to the prosecutor.



# AUGUST



## 8.6.19—National Night Out Against Crime

The **National Night Out Against Crime** event is held the first Tuesday of August. National Night Out showcases the vital importance of police-community partnerships and citizen involvement in our fight to build a safer community. This event was co-sponsored by the Rotary of Monroe and City of Monroe in partnership with community businesses, service groups, faith groups, service providers, Monroe Fire District #7, and citizens.



Family activities include: Police K9 Demos, Fire Rescues, Bouncy House, Community Resources, refreshments and many more fun family activities with an emphasis on public safety.

## 8.28.19—Outreach Team

The Community Outreach Team consisting of Elisa Delgado and Officer Justin Springer were featured in the Snohomish Tribune published on August 28th. The Tribune accompanied the team on a morning shift in July and observed as they did outreach and engaged with people living on the street, working to connect those they encountered to service providers.

## 8.28.19—Rescue Vehicle

The City of Monroe received a new rescue vehicle that will be used in emergency operations in our Community and to support our multi-agency North Sound Metro SWAT team. It can safely transport and protect up to five persons during a multitude of incidents to include rescue, tactical, and flooding operations. This vehicle was received through a grant with the Department of Defense 1033 Law Enforcement Support Officer (LESO) Program.



## 8.29.19—International Conference

**Sergeant Paul Ryan** had the opportunity to speak at the International Crisis Intervention Team Conference which was held in Seattle. He provided information to the attendees on the Outreach Program with our Embedded Social Worker Elisa Delgado and Officer Springer, specifically covering their efforts of balancing outreach with accountability.

# SEPTEMBER

## 9.4.19—Vehicle vs. Building Collision

A vehicle went into a business in the 19900 blk of SR 2. The 92-year-old female driver was not injured. The vehicle was approaching the store, went up onto the sidewalk and through the glass front. No one in the store was injured in the collision.



## 9.17.19—Bucky Award

Community Service Officer Gaby Escalante was honored by Pasado's Safe Haven in recognition of her work on an animal abuse case that occurred in Monroe on April 23, 2019. The investigation, which resulted in felony convictions for Animal Cruelty 1st Degree and Possession of a Stolen Firearm, along with a subsequent felony charge from Lake Stevens Police Department for Attempt to Elude, resulted in a thirteen-month sentence. In recognition of her comprehensive and quality investigation, Pasado's Safe Haven awarded CSO Escalante the "Bucky Award" which is an annual award to raise the awareness about crimes against animals and to recognizes officers who do exceptional work on these difficult cases.



## 10.3.19—Encampment Clean-up

Officers went out to assist the WA Dept. of Transportation (DOT) with the clean up of several encampments on DOT property. We continue to work with property owners to identify encampments, notify occupants to vacate, trespass violators and assist with cleanup.



## 10.3.19—K-9 Tango Arrest

**K-9 Tango** and **Officer Southard** responded to assist the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office with a possible vehicle prowl or burglary that was occurring at Wallace Falls Mobile Home Park. The suspect, when confronted with Tango made a good decision and came out with his hands held high in the air. He was then taken into custody. Another great job Tango!

## 10.8.19—Encampments Located

City of Monroe Parks personnel and Monroe Officers located an encampment on City property north of Lake Tye as well as an encampment in the woods south of Sky River Park. Police responded and obtained search warrants after seeing visible drug paraphernalia. Syringes, baggies, drug paraphernalia, and stolen property were located during the search warrants.

# NOVEMBER

## 11.13.19—Deputy Chief

Interim Deputy Chief Ryan Irving accepted the permanent position as Deputy Chief for the Monroe Police Department. Deputy Chief Ryan had served the department as the Interim Deputy Chief since June of 2018. He has been a vital member of our agency in many capacities to include Police Officer, K9 Narcotics Officer, Detective, and Sergeant. He was also instrumental in the research, planning, and implementation of the Embedded Social Worker Program.



## 11.21.19—Theft of Garden Cart

An employee of a closed business watched as a suspect stole a garden cart from the parking lot of the business. The employee called 911 and gave a description of the vehicle. Officers arrived in the area and located the suspect vehicle nearby. The driver was taken into custody for Theft 3rd Degree and booked into Snohomish County Jail. K-9 Sam and Officer Devin Tucker responded to the scene for a Narcotics K9 application. K-9 Sam alerted to the vehicle resulting in a vehicle impound and search warrant application. Upon serving the search warrant, officers located heroin, methamphetamine, digital scales, mushrooms (suspected to be illegally possessed), oxycodone, a stolen firearm, license plate, debit cards, and cash.



## Automated External Defibrillator (AED) Grant

The Monroe Police Department applied for a grant to purchase AEDs. The grant application was successful and the Police Department was awarded \$10,000 from the Tulalip Tribe Charitable Fund. The grant will assist the department in outfitting the patrol vehicles with an AED device which is a critical tool to save lives.

**12.6.19—Search Warrant**

Monroe Police with the assistance of the North Sound Metro SWAT team executed a search warrant on in the 20500 block of Horizon Way. Detectives searched the residence for evidence of fired weapons, spent ammunition and bullet fragments. A 30-year-old male from Monroe was booked into the Snohomish County Jail on Assault 2 and Unlawful Imprisonment charges. A 40-year-old male from Monroe was booked on an outstanding warrant.

**12.7.19—Same Story, Second Arrest**

The individual who was arrested on November 21st for the theft of a garden cart was stopped on December 7th for traffic related violations. The officer recognized the driver from his recent arrest and called for a narcotics K9 who alerted on the vehicle. A search warrant was obtained and the following items were seized: a stolen pistol, methamphetamine, heroin, oxycodone, and various drug paraphernalia.

**12.12.19—Purse Snatcher in Custody**

A 37-year-old male was arrested after an officer responded to a theft call where a purse had been accidentally left on the back of a wheelchair when the chair was returned to the lobby after use. The officer viewed the video surveillance, immediately recognized the suspect and quickly got information out to officers patrolling the streets. The male was located and taken into custody without incident. He admitted to take the purse and burying it near the movie theater. Officers found the buried purse and were able to return it to the victim with all contents intact. The male was transported to the Snohomish County Jail and booked on Theft 2 and Drug Paraphernalia Possession charges.

## 12.10.19—Citizen's Academy

Twenty-one citizens graduated from the Monroe Police Department Citizen's Academy. The Citizen's Academy is an eight-week course to provide Monroe community members with first-hand information about how their Police Department works.




## 12.19.19—Shop With a Cop





# NIBRS

The Monroe Police Department collects crime statistics using a system called the National Incident-Based Reporting System or NIBRS. Since 1930, the FBI has administered the Uniform Crime Reporting Program using statistics supplied by the various states.





The table above provides information regarding response time (time a call is received in Dispatch to the first patrol unit on-scene). The priority of 1-5 reflects the seriousness of the call, with lower numbers reflecting higher priority incidents.

According to the Matrix Consulting Group which conducted a staffing study of the department in 2019, "MPD response times for all priority calls types are exceptional...In sum, these figures reflect some of the best overall response times this project team has observed."


### Community Outreach Team
