



Fun Fact: Al Borlin Park is a great spot to view pink salmon (humpy) as they swim up Woods Creek in the fall. Look for them in odd-numbered years.

Know before you go: Lewis Street Park offers paved parking and a restroom facility. The Al Borlin Park entrance off Simons Road does not include restroom facilities.

Al Borlin Park is part of Monroe's River Greenbelt system—parks situated along the Skykomish River preserve, and nature interpretation. These preservation sites offer space for quiet reflection, wildlife observation, and a deeper connection to the natural world around Monroe.

Located on a scenic peninsula formed by the confluence of the Skykomish River and Woods Creek, it offers a peaceful retreat just steps from town. Access the park from Lewis Street Park by crossing picturesque footbridge over Woods Creek, where you'll enter a black cottonwood forest rich with native plants and wildlife.

Wander along more than 1,000 feet of pebble-strewn shoreline—perfect for dipping your toes or skipping stones. Pack a picnic and make use of one of the park's barbecue grills, or spend the afternoon exploring the 1.2-mile nature loop trail that winds through the forest and along the river. A secondary entrance is located off Simons Road for easy access.

CEDAR GROVE PARK

15394 168th Ave. SE



This small, quiet neighborhood park includes a children's play structure and a small picnic area. The park includes shaded, grassy areas ideal for an afternoon picnic or an open space area for playing frisbee.

WIGGLY FIELD OFF-LEASH DOG PARK

413 Sky River Pkwy.

Located at the South end of Skykomish River Park, this 2.5-acre dog park includes dog agility equipment, shade trees, a dog drinking fountain, and a small covered shelter.

Know before you go: Three sides are enclosed with a 4-foot split-rail fence. Wire mesh is added during the summer months to deter small dogs from wandering out of bounds. That mesh is removed during winter months (roughly October through April) in order to withstand annual flooding. The design keeps costs down and minimizes fence damage due to flooding events. During flood months the parking lot will often be closed but the park can always be accessed by walking through Skykomish River Park.

TOP PARK-RELATED FAQs

Are boats allowed on Lake Tye?
No gas-powered motors of any size and no electric motors in excess of 1 3/4 HP, including model boats, are allowed on Lake Tye, unless otherwise approved by a special event permit. (MMC.9.28.110)

Can I fish at Lake Tye?
Although fishing is allowed year-round, you must have a fishing license, as required by the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife.

Are dogs allowed off-leash in the City of Monroe?
Dogs must be leashed at all times, except within Wiggly Field Off-Leash Dog Park.

HILLCREST PARK

14175 County Crescent Rd. SE



Tucked in the heart of The Farm, this quaint neighborhood park is a welcoming spot to gather and enjoy the outdoors. It features a half-court basketball area for casual games, a playground for kids, picnic tables for lunch or relaxation, and a small covered picnic shelter ideal for shade or a light rain. A meandering walking path connects the park to nearby homes and streets, with access available from the main entrance as well as Springbrook and Corbridge Roads. Grab a book and a spot under the shelter for an inviting area to read.

TROMBLEY PARK

Corner of 191 St. Ave. SE & 134th St. SE

In 2021 the City of Monroe purchased this 5-acre site. The goal for this land is to develop it into a neighborhood park. With the input from surrounding neighbors, the city developed a preliminary design for the future development of the park. The future development is funding dependent. For now, the public is welcome to enjoy this large, wide-open grass area.


WALES STREET PARK

MONROE BOARD & BLADE SKATE PARK

The Monroe Board and Blade Skate Park is a street-style skateboard park located adjacent Lake Tye. STANTON MEADOWS PARK

This is a 3.5-acre neighborhood park designed to be a family-oriented park with a picnic shelter, picnic areas with barbecues, and a children's play area. It is the east terminus of a walking trail that runs west to Fryelands Blvd. which links to Lake Tye Park. Come enjoy a quiet picnic lunch at the gazebo while observing local bird activity within the park's wetland. Or, grab the neighborhood kids for an impromptu pickup game of soccer or frisbee. If you're willing to pack a few things this would make a great location for a pick up game of cornhole.



TRAVELERS PARK

501 E. Main St.

Located at the intersection of US-2 and Main Street, this property is owned by the State Department of Transportation and leased to the city for park use. This 1-acre park is designed to provide a welcome rest stop for weary travelers on their way through Monroe and offers parking and a picnic area.

Fun Fact: The large tree at the park is a Coastal Sequoia - originally donated to the city by the Monroe Garden Club.

MONROE BOARD & BLADE SKATE PARK

14964 Fryelands Blvd.



Located just north of the scenic Lewis Street Bridge, this park is the oldest in the Monroe Park System and features century-old cedar trees, a children's play area including a traverse wall, arch swing, covered picnic area, restrooms and a pedestrian bridge that crosses Woods Creek into Al Borlin Park. A parking area to the south provides easy access to the park. This picturesque trailing beneath the rugged Cascade Range.

SKYKOMISH (SKY) RIVER PARK

413 Sky River Pkwy.

With more than 32 acres, Skykomish River Park — also referred to as Sky River Park is one of two community parks in Monroe. It includes an athletic field complex with four natural grass baseball fields, two designated pickleball courts, three soccer fields, restrooms and a concession building. A .75-mile long pathway rounds out the park with outdoor exercise equipment that attracts walkers throughout the summer. The park also includes two large covered shelters that can be reserved for parties, a large children's play area, outdoor picnic areas and ample parking.

The playground, renovated in 2018, is designed with a river and athletic theme and features a cable climbing net and a unique, ADA accessible playground structure and glide swing.

Sky River Park is also home to Rotary Field - an all-weather youth baseball facility specifically designed to be ADA accessible and to house Miracle League.

This community park is home to many of the city's largest community events. Visit MonroeWA.gov/266 to view the city's current events brochure.



TRAIL

Lake Tye Park offers a 1.63-mile paved, ADA accessible trail. Restrooms located on-site.

TRAIL

Al Borlin Park offers a 1.2-mile nature loop trail that winds through the forest and along the river. This is a dirt and/or gravel path. The Lewis Street Park entrance offers parking and a restroom facility. Or, try the second entrance off Simons Road.

TRAIL

Skykomish (Sky) River Park offers a .75-mile paved, ADA accessible trail. Restrooms located on-site at Rotary Field and at the concession building.
